


Flare-Up In Chenab Valley

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

irca 1990. Kashmir was in the throes of insurgency and militancy was high. But a girl named Zoona (name withheld to protect privacy) was blissfully ignorant of it all. She was happy in her own world, as all teenagers would be. She led a simple life with her parents and siblings, and her world was joyful. The blood and gore had not touched her yet. Not yet. But all that would change one night.





Tortured Till She Broke

Local militants swooped on Zoona's house in North Kashmir and carried her away. Over the next few days, Zoona was subjected to torture till she mentally broke down and agreed to marry against her wishes, a man named Hameed (not his real name). Marriages are made in heaven, so goes the saying. But for Zoona, it was not even made in hell. It was worse than that.

For the next 34 years, ravaged by time and tied in a life not of her choosing, Zoona lived a life of hell. She never enjoyed the happy emotions of a bride or a young wife.

Marriages That Scarred Women

Married but without wedding ceremony may sound awkward. But the land of Kashmir witnessed such marriage knots.

These knots put scars over the hearts of thousands of Kashmiri women. The women still remember, they are still traumatised by the cruelty and the emotionless episodes of over two decades or more ago.

Zoona is in her 50s now. Recently, her husband Hameed died. After three and a half decades, Zoona is finally looking at life afresh. A life free of the shackles of stress and anxiety, pain and suffering. She did not shed a drop of tear, there was no sorrow on her face. Zoona buried her past with Hameed - a past of torment and cruelty that snuffed out her dreams.

Foreign Media Never Talks Of The Zoonas Of Kashmir

So many times, we read reports in the foreign media where they glorify militancy in Kashmir. They romanticise militancy through their writings and photographs. But they never talk of the Zoonas of Kashmir.

The story of Zoona and many others like her are quietly spoken of in the Valley. These Zoonas of Kashmir carry within them deep scars of violence and cruelty, torture and abuse. These hundreds of Zoonas were brutalised by the heroes of militancy.

Their dreams were shattered. Many like Zoona continued to suffer silently. Forget love, they never knew the joy of being married, never knew what togetherness means. There was nothing normal in their life, there was no happiness.

Global Media Blind To Pain Of These Women

The global media has been a mute witness to the travails that the Zoonas of Kashmir suffered. These simple women suffered the scars of terrorism. They continued to live life for the sake of their children and grandchildren.

The dark age of militancy saw thousands of women and children lose their happiness and peace. The society was ruined by terrorism and the writ of the militants ran large. They picked the girls that they wanted and exploited them. In the name of jihad, countless women and girls were forced into physical relationships.

Can a society that suffers such abuse survive? The wounds of victimization never heal even if one tries the best medicine of time.

ashmir is a high-intensity region. Every terror movement is closely tracked here, and swift action is taken.

ome select sociopolitical organizations in the regions of Doda, Kishtwar and Bhaderwah have undertaken deliberate and sustained efforts for establishing the notion of Islamist supremacy in Chenab valley region. This has been happening over the last few years.

On the surface, these NGOs claim to be welfare bodies. They help the Muslim community and also the Hindu community as part of their welfare initiatives. Local observers say that in this way, they are able to maintain the façade of being secular.

But those who have analyzed the security situation in the Chenab valley closely say that these NGOs are actually playing a very sinister role. The leaders of these NGOs are overtly and covertly deepening the notions of Islamist supremacy in Chenab valley regions. The leaders of these NGOs are expanding their reach in the Jammu region too. Poster boys of these NGOs and socio-political bodies here are playing a very clever game. They are traversing in grey zones of indoctrination while carefully staying within the legal space. They are actively using social media or public spaces to say, write or do things that make crowds of people excited or angry with communal overtones. This is being done systematically and intentionally, so that when the command is given, the crowds may act in a particular way. Close observers warn that this has the potential to lead to a difficult upsurge of youth in Kishtwar, Doda, Bhaderwah, Ramban-Banihal.

Anybody who thinks that this is an over-statement needs to study the Chenab valley region closely.


Sustained Counter Action Not Taken Situation Being Allowed To Drift

Leaders of these NGOs are misusing the democratic space to indoctrinate the youth into Islamist supremacy. Over the last few years, these leaders have built a massive physical and online following.

The following of these leaders has people of all ages. They have also attracted a sizable section of the local







youth. In the huge physical or online crowds that some leaders of these NGOs gather, one may see many 30 to 50 year olds.

But the threat to internal and external security will not come from those who are aged 30-50 or more. People of a mature age have learnt to discern between right and wrong.

The cause of concern is that these NGOs are deepening the indoctrination of a section of the youth. The ones to get influenced will be the teenagers. Those in the age-group of 14-25 years are impacted. Through continuous indoctrination, these youths are shaped as ready raw material. If they are inflamed, then they only wait for time and ammunition. When the time comes, they are ready to undertake violent action.

Government intervention is needed urgently for damage control initiatives.

The area has been quiet recently, but that does not mean that the threat is not lurking. A close observer of the area says it is possible that hybrid militants are being prepared. It is equally possible that hybrid militants may already be part of sleeper cells here, and may strike at will.

Rabble-Rousing Local Leaders Have Been Booked Earlier

Leaders of some of these NGOs who are engaging in divisive action are in the radar of the security forces. Some of them have also been booked for their anti-state actions. The unfortunate part is that the situation is being allowed to drift. There is no sustained action against these leaders. At ground level, it seems that the state is allowing a free run to the divisive forces.

An observer in Doda gave the example of the heads of some religious organizations in Punjab, Haryana, Gujarat and other states. These organizations were allowed to have an unbridled growth, and their followers ran into thousands or lakhs.

When allegations of serious misconduct were raised against the leaders of some of these organizations, the government tried to take legal action against them. By that time, these organizations had become so big that it became a mammoth task for the state to rein in their misuse of power.

A similar situation seems to be developing in the Chenab valley region, and it is unchecked.


Chenab valley region has been home to under-currents of radicalization since the beginning of terrorism in Kashmir. These may have gone down by about 20 per cent in the last few years. But they were too high earlier. Even 80 per cent is too huge. It normalizes radicalization.

Anti-national people make use of such radicalized youth, who fall easily to brain-washing. Some NGOs are evidently acting upon a deliberate design. Somebody has applied the mind to strengthen radical trends here.

We cannot be sure that the problem of hybrid militancy is limited to Kashmir. It may have spread its tentacles to Chenab valley region.

It may have spread its tentacles to Chenab valley region Over the last few decades, Chenab Valley region has bred a large number of terrorists. Many of them are absconding and are in POK. They and other terror operators continue their efforts to influence the youth here. There is need to be highly cautious of the under-currents that these anti-state players are activating.

Since the early years of terrorism in Kashmir, radicalization has deep roots in the Chenab valley region. Undercurrents of radicalization and indoctrination have been strong since militancy started in Kashmir. While terrorism was at its peak, a number of terrorists hailed from Doda, Kishtwar, Bhaderwah, Ramban and the adjoining areas of Chenab valley.

Region Needs Strong Productive NGOs with influential leaders

If I am a youth of Chenab valley, you have to see things from my perspective. As of now, I do not have any alternatives. The region does not offer any major recreational opportunities. There is no strong NGO working in a positive space with influential and popular leaders.

Other civil society members who may be considered influential are of an elderly generation. The youth cannot connect with them. Society needs someone young, dynamic and influential who is on the right lines. The youth need an alternate leader, and that should be provided by the civil community. Then the negative forces will lose their sheen. But this counter space has nobody. It's a vacuum.

Threshold Of Both Communities Has Gone Down

In the past, whenever there were communal flare-ups or massacres, responsible locals from both communities acted in a mature manner to control the fires. It seems that on both sides now, the threshold has gone down.

If there is any communal flare-up, the reaction of the Hindu community is likely to be more firm, more aggressive.

No Mechanism To Monitor The Local Madrasas

There is no mechanism from the government to monitor who is teaching what in the local madrasas. There is no teacher qualification. One can see minimal efforts of the district administration to take any remedial proactive action in this space.

We have observed that there are very few of us from the same community who are ready to talk about these dangerous undercurrents. We see a worrisome situation building up. Anybody can fuel it. We have seen that happen earlier. It may happen even now.

Radicalized NGOs are taking the centerstage for religious matters. In private conversations, senior leaders admit that this damage is happening. They are able to foresee that if any communal flare-up happens, it will be due to the work of the leaders of some NGOs who are working on radical lines.

These NGO leaders are radicalizing youth. Thereafter, the youth can be approached by terror organizations. These youth can be indoctrinated by Pakistan's terror operators. Their vulnerability is high.

t is important to note that by and large, the Muslim community or the Hindu community of Chenab valley does not support radicalization or polarization. They want old traditions of harmonious co-existence to continue. But the traditions of harmony and peace are being deliberately damaged by some new local leaders.

The problem is that no counter-work is being done to negate it. If eminent members of the civil society are recognizing the threat and vulnerability that is building up, they are quiet about it.

The more worrying part is that the district administration is also not filling the space. The divisive forces are conveniently playing upon the space provided by democracy. The security apparatus is aware of these divisive forces. But appropriate action has not been initiated.

Greater Govt Focus On Employment Opportunities Is Vital

In Doda and Kishtwar, a very high percentage of the local population comprises the labour



class. Most of these men go to Himachal Pradesh or to Ladakh to earn a livelihood. The youth have no major employment opportunities locally. There is also a lack of a strong work culture. The will to work is low.

In large parts of the Chenab valley region, Pakistani propaganda is believed to be true.

The matter of concern is that indoctrination promotes militancy and terrorism. The negative ideologues are active. If ISI flares up communal violence, the youth may themselves pick up guns.

The region cannot afford to suffer more such communal flare-ups.

The kind of targeted attack that Rajouri witnessed recently – if that happens here, it will pose a challenge for the state.

Low Local Engagement, Youth Believe In Pakistani Propaganda

Parts of the Chenab valley region are still difficult to access,

like Desa etc. In those far-flung villages too, the youth have no local employment opportunities.

The state has not reached out to these youth or engaged them in meaningful activities. The result is that the youth believe Pakistan's propaganda.

The leaders of some NGOs here are using this vacuum to plant ideologies and influence the youth. The polarization is being carried out unbridled, in the name of political activism. Local observers know that the whole exercise is agendadriven.

The Chenab valley region is marked by high altitudes and mountain terrain. The state must stay mindful of the consequences if the youth are influenced negatively. Strategies must be formulated and executed at ground level accordingly.

Perhaps the state can examine the possibility of empowering local youth groups that can counter the negative trends.

Our policy planners know that the state shall spend far less on youth engagement. The state spends far more on deploying security forces and counter-terror mechanisms. These positive strategies must be put into action with greater force and determination.

The UT Administration has Mission Youth initiatives. In one activity or the other, the youth have to be engaged. There are many options. Sports. Skill development can be provided to the youth in areas where they can look for self-employment later.

Youth can be trained in the management of tourism and adventure activities. All across Kashmir, the Chenab valley, Jammu region – there is endless scope for generating revenue and self-employment through tourism and adventure.

There is a ready market globally for the valued Kashmiri arts and crafts. The government can provide organized training in these areas.

A section of the youth is interested in higher studies. The State can initiate multiple programs like Super 30 for them.

The youth who are interested in the digital space can be given training in Communication And Information Technology, camera management, video editing and many other options. Training in different areas of agriculture and livestock management, vocal and instrumental music. The possibilities are endless.

In some districts of Kashmir, the DCs have taken up exemplary initiatives for youth engagement. This needs to be replicated across all of Kashmir, Chenab valley region, Jammu, Ladakh and Kargil.

ISI's ideologues are active in Kashmir. They are also active in the Chenab region.

We have consistently seen this pattern. ISI influences the thought, and the youth pick up guns. It is time for the state to influence the thought and shape the narrative through continuous positive interventions.

With the support of the same people, the district administration named the same park after a martyred police officer and installed the board on its entrance.

During the Jashn-e-Nawjawan event in Pulwama in April 2022, thousands of youth participated enthusiastically. The same day, two terrorists were killed in the district. The earlier pattern was that youth used to rush to take part in the funeral rallies of militants. But last year, they enjoyed the festivities at Jashn-e-Nawjawan event. This proved once again that there is no room for unscrupulous elements in our society and peace is the way ahead. All this has been possible with the unrelenting efforts of the civil and police leadership in the district. The DC and the SSP have remained at the forefront to turn Pulwama into the real heaven that is Kashmir.
